Dear sisters in the League,

Putting aside some of the less than friendly weather we have experienced these past months, we are, nonetheless in a wonderful time of the year because, as Christians, we get to celebrate two marvelous liturgical seasons – Lent and Easter, and, as Catholics, we are doubly blessed because our liturgy gives us an abundance of powerful rituals, symbols and stories that reach all the way across our salvation history from the first chapter of Genesis and the creation story to the vision of the new Jerusalem in the Book of Revelation. However, because we are so familiar with these seasons after years of repeating them, we may not spend much time thinking about them or fully appreciate exactly what we are celebrating, and what some non-Catholics might think of our religious behavior.

For example, not everyone goes around with a dark smudge on their forehead on a certain Wednesday in February or March. You know the one I mean. But I remember one time I attended a ministerial meeting when I had just been to an Ash Wednesday service. Another minister there commented that I had some dirt on my forehead. I quietly explained to him the significance of the 'dirt', and he seemed to appreciate that, because he had never heard of it. It was one of those simple teaching moments for both of us. I had to remember why I had ashes on my forehead, and he learned something about the Catholic tradition of Lent.

A good example of a Lenten prayer tradition is the Stations of the Cross. We are not surprised to see them in all Catholic churches. They give us comfort and peace of mind and heart. But someone unfamiliar with them may feel uncomfortable taking part in such a prayer.

Holy Week gives us lots colour, action and scripture with palms, washing of feet, and the veneration of the cross. The Easter Vigil hails the sacred fire, and the Pascal candle, and we hear a brief history of our salvation story (7readings) from the Old Testament, and which culminates as the central tenet of our faith, the resurrection of Jesus from the dead. We renew our baptismal promises and make our profession of faith that we will live our lives in the full expectation of entering into the glory of God's kingdom when our life upon this earth is ended.

While the world around carries on with its affairs, we dare to proclaim loudly that our true hope lies in the world to come, and from this exultant celebration of life in Christ that we go forth into the world to bring it the good news that Christ is risen. He is risen indeed. This call to go forth is even more meaningful this Jubilee year when we have taken on the name <u>**Pilgrims of Hope**</u> and we sing the refrain of the Jubilee hymn " Like a flame my hope is burning, may my song arise to you; source of life that has no ending, on life's path I trust in you." Blessed may your Easter be.

In mid- January I received an email from National Life Member Liaison, Jacqueline Nogier, requesting that each provincial life member liaison send in an annual report on the activities of the life members in their province. This was an interesting exercise as it confirmed that life members continued to give support and active service to National, through their involvement in parish councils.

In their personal activities all attended and supported their CWL parish council meetings and activities. Three life members were on the Saskatchewan Provincial CWL Council in their capacity as president, past president and life member liaison. Several served on the 2024 National Convention Committee. Life members, in their quest to keep the League flourishing, responded to the needs of their members by giving workshops, encouraging members to take on leadership roles, and generally working with councils to keep them viable.

Life members also contributed through their participation on committees and workshops. One honorary life member provided faith workshops in her community and elsewhere. At the provincial fall workshop, another life member made presentations on several topics and held a virtual workshop on preparing a Parish Council Procedures Manual. She was also appointed to a national sub-committee.

Thinking "outside the box", one life member decided to follow up on Past National President, Fran Lucas' building relations focus, by hosting small group gatherings in her home. During "tea and crumpets", she would lead the conversation on how these women could share their talents on their CWL council. In her position on the planning committee of a youth rally in her diocese, she invited CWL members to provide a prayer ministry to the youth during the rally. Participants were invited to write their prayer requests on a sticky note and paste it on the window of the prayer room. CLW members collected the notes and prayed for their intentions. She said students checked the prayer room to see if they were really praying for them, and one student came in asking them to teach her to pray! The number of CWL volunteers has nearly tripled since this began. This same life member was also asked to organize a faith building experience involving seniors and the youth at the rally. She hosted five tables of six youth, and each group was guided in provoking conversation by at least one retiree. The first gathering was a huge success and will continue in the future.

These are only a few examples of all the good work our life members are doing in our province. Not only are they honoured to be life members, but they accept the responsibility that goes with the position.

<u>CWL Jubilee Pilgrimage to Rome</u> (November 19-27) – Join League sisters for a faith-filled pilgrimage during the Jubilee Year. Limited to 44 pilgrims, check cwl.ca for more details.

<u>Canonization of Blessed Carlos Acutis</u> (April 27) – Councils are encouraged to promote the canonization of Blessed Carlos Acutis – (often referred to as the Patron Saint of the Internet), and the first Saint from Generation Y (millennials) – to young people in their parish and to use the occasion to invite young women 16 years and older to learn more about becoming a member.

<u>Fostering Vocations</u> (May 11) – The Church celebrates World Day of Prayer for Vocations on May 11. Councils and members are invited to reflect on the meaning of God's call and to pray for all vocations. What can you do at your May meeting to promote this day?

<u>WUCWO Day</u> (May 13) – The League has membership in the World Union of Catholic Women's Organizations (WUCWO) to advance women's role in the life and mission of the Church. Check out the WUCWO website for a spiritual program to unite in prayer with women worldwide. Something else to include in your May meeting!

<u>Rosary Webinar of Hope for Healing and Reconciliation</u> (June 21) – The League is committed to its pilgrimage experience of Walking Together in hope with Indigenous Peoples. Members are invited to join in reflecting on this mission while praying the Rosary on this day. Check cwl.ca for more details.

As we continue on our journey as Pilgrim's of Hope, remember that we will always be given everything we need to continue on. One of my favorite songs is by Steve Bell, and this verse gets me through a lot:
