Presidents Report, November 23, 2019

Greetings everyone!

Our first Fall Meeting and Gathering after the summer break was held on September 9, 2019 hosted by Holy Spirit Parish Council, Saskatoon. We had a successful meeting and received positive feedback on our speakers. Fr Denis Phaneuf who spoke about Spirituality and Health for Catholics and Cathy Lefleche who gave us information on The Pregnancy Options Centre. We had 60 ladies registered and attend. Thank you, ladies, for your reports, they were very well thought out and informative.

Our first workshop with our new theme, *Care of Our Common Home* was held on September 14, 2019 in the St. Angela's Region of our Diocese at Eston. The workshop, was created and designed by Marlene Van Dresser, Margo de la Gorgendière, Mary Kehrig and Audrey Zimmerman. Thank you, ladies, for the time and effort that was put into this. Thank you to Claire Heron who gave us a bed and breakfast at her home in Eston and a lovely dinner on Friday evening. Thank you to all of the Eston CWL for their hospitality and help in hosting this retreat, and to Connie Crichton and Margaret Schwab who drove out on Saturday to present the Strategic Planning as part of our workshop. We had a small group of 10 ladies attending, two from Fox Valley, one from Eatonia and the ladies of Eston. We had some very good comments on our evaluation sheets for the workshop.

Our second workshop was held in Cudworth on October 5, 2019. We had 12 ladies attending. We had a good workshop with a lot of good discussion on CWL issues as well as the concern they had of the lack of younger members in their council as well as in their Parish. We encouraged them to keep on praying and that Our Lord and Our Lady of Good Council are still in charge. They were very interested in hearing about the Strategic Planning of CWL.

October 10, we held our first Convention planning meeting for the April 2, 2020 Diocesan Convention to be held at Holy Spirit Parish in Saskatoon. I will be reporting on this later.

Mary Kehrig and I attended the Human Trafficking awareness event in Saskatoon on October 28th hosted by NASHI. The speakers were very informative and a video was presented on the success of the safe house in Ukraine known as the Maple Leaf House. A 13,000 sq. ft house located in Ukraine, purchased through private donations and the many fundraising activities of NASHI. The house provides a nurturing, healing environment for up to 20 young girls, as opposed to the warehousing of an orphanage. The girls receive life skills and attend regular school. They receive medical, dental and vision care as well as post secondary education, in an effort to divert them from human trafficking. CWL has been kept informed of the progress and has attended many of their events its inception 14 years ago. The founder Savalia was attending a CWL event in Manitoba on human trafficking a few weeks after this event. She has asked us to keep her in our prayers, since she was diagnosed with cancer a year ago, but seems to be doing very well in her recovery.

I attended the **Arise retreat** held at St Therese Institute in Bruno on October 18 to 20 along with 250 other ladies from Saskatchewan, Alberta and Manitoba. The retreat was very well publicised through social media and was sold out in 8 hours. With the support of Bishop Mark Hagemoen, the retreat was jointly sponsored by the Roman Catholic Diocese of Saskatoon and the Alumni of Catholic Christian Outreach (CCO) with support from sponsors and organised by a group of volunteers. The retreat was steeped in prayer, thoughtfulness and the effort to make each participant feel as though they were being shown God's love personally and intimately. I felt it was a very worthwhile and successful retreat. Please pray that another retreat will be held in the near future for us as CWL and for the many ladies who wanted to attend but were unable.

October 26, 2019 Marlene VanDresar, Connie Crichton and myself facilitated the Regional workshop in Unity. We had an attendance of 20. Father Greg Roth attended the morning session. Connie Crichton finished the afternoon by her presentation on The Strategic Plan for CWL.

February 1,2020 we will be having our Winter Gathering at Holy Family Cathedral with Albert Brown, Director of Justice Programs and Saskatoon Community Services as our guest speaker and will give us information on growing epidemic of Pornography.

Our Lady of Grace Region Saskatoon will be hosting a workshop to be be held on February 29, 2020 at Holy Family Cathedral beginning at 10 AM. Thank you to Holy family Council for hosting these two events.

I am looking forward to attending the Aboriginal Information evening on November 26, 2019 at St Mary's Parish, Saskatoon.

WEAR RED ON FRIDAYS Marie Rackley, National Chairperson for Community Life, asks CWL members to wear red on Fridays as a showing that you are supporting our troops. She writes, "Participating in the 'Wear Red on Fridays' initiative demonstrates to Canadians and troops that members care and honour those who fought and continue to fight for freedom, peace and our resolve. Consider showing you care by supporting the troops and wearing RED on FRIDAYS.

On November 26th, Guadalupe Parish and the Provincial CWL Council is hosting an Indigenous Awareness Presentation at St. Mary's Church, upper hall, at 6:30 pm. This is a good opportunity for us to learn and understand the Spiritual and traditions of our Indigenous Sisters. Let's have a good turnout.

In his message on the "Third World Day of the Poor," which was on Sunday, November 17, Pope Francis writes, "We can never elude the urgent appeal that Scripture makes on behalf of the poor. Wherever we look, the word of God points to the poor, those who lack the necessities of life because they depend on others. They are the oppressed, the lowly and the downcast. Yet, faced with countless throngs of the poor, Jesus was not afraid to identify with each of them: "Whatever you did to one of the least of these my brethren, you did to me" (Mt 25:40). If we refuse to make this identification, we falsify the Gospel and water down God's revelation. The God that Jesus came to reveal is a Father who is generous, merciful, unfailing in his goodness and grace. He gives hope especially to those who are disillusioned and lacking in hope for the future. How can we fail to note that the Beatitudes with which Jesus began his preaching of the kingdom of God open with the words: "Blessed are you who are poor" (Lk 6:20)? The meaning of this paradoxical message is that the kingdom of God belongs to the poor because they are in a position to receive it. How many poor people do we encounter each day! It seems that the passage of time and the advances of civilization increase their numbers rather than diminishing them. Centuries go by and the Beatitude appears even more paradoxical: the poor are always poorer, and today they are poorer than ever. Yet Jesus who inaugurated his kingdom by placing the poor at the centre, wanted to tell us precisely this: he inaugurated the kingdom, but he has entrusted to us, his disciples, the task of carrying it forward with responsibility for giving hope to the poor. Especially at times like our own, there is a need to revive hope and to restore confidence. This responsibility is not something that the Christian community may underestimate. The credibility of our proclamation and the witness of Christians depends on it.

The Human Trafficking Awareness Day co-ordinated by Nashi revealed the effects of pornography and realities of the sex trade. Internet, videos and cell phones are extensively used in pornography especially in the United States but organized crime is highest in Cambodia and Thailand. Children are sold by parents or grabbed off streets.

Albert Brown is the co-ordinator of the John School in Saskatoon. The John School is a program for persons 18 years and up who have committed an offense of "communication for the purpose of prostitution".

Since 2001, 600 people under 16, with average age 13, have been apprehended for sexual involvement which included drug abuse. 102 adults have completed John School. This is only addressed when charged by a group of several police. Both adults and staff sign confidentiality in treatment.

Each day starts with prayers where they ask to remove the stone from their heart so they can walk in freedom with power in Jesus. As they sit in a circle and by answering a series of questions everyone tells their story. Telling their story gets rid of emotional baggage. This disempowers unresolved grief by dealing with it. Feelings pushed down create anger and misunderstanding.

Counsellors both from Regina and Saskatoon explained positive relationship styles to control thought awareness and life-long decision making. Take ownership and improve communication skills to resolve problems for a conscious change. Don't give up as results come with perseverance.

A former John stated that one issue (pornography) can start a problem. "Find a solution to affirm love. God is creator of everything. Everyone is equal to God's love. God gives strength for a second chance as he paid a price with his life for all of us."

His wife related how her husband's actions robbed her well-being, killing the fruits of the spirit. She felt she deserved better. Forgiveness, a gift from God, helped her as Jesus forgave her sins on the cross.

A father expressed the effects on the family when his daughter, lured from the Regina Exhibition, was taken into a sex trafficking ring in Western Canada.

Two women explained their different struggles to create positive change as they dealt with being sexually exploited. It was sad to hear that no aboriginals helped them.

An American trained in law enforcement and criminal justice gave their perspective o trafficking. They are very aggressive in the States with death penalty for child rapist and 25 years prison for child trafficking.

May we pray to be aware of life's problems, create solutions and make intentional changes for a positive lifestyle in God's love and glory.

Resolutions and Legislation Report

Core Executive Meeting November 2019

National Chairperson of Legislation, Betty Colaneri, issued Communique #6 on 15 October with a focus on the 21 October federal election. She pointed out Bill C-76 Elections Modernization Act which limits third party spending during a defined period before the election period. There is an increase in actions by third parties, domestic and foreign, to interfere in the elections process. This means more than ever that eligible voters should get out and vote and be informed. To this end a list of party websites was included and mention of the CCCB's *Voting as Catholics: 2019 Federal Election Guide*, and a Novalis publication *For Heaven's Sake, Vote!* This is old news; however, we will be enduring municipal and provincial elections in the fall of 2020 and the same principles will apply. Bill C-50 deals with an advertising and reporting regime for fundraising events attended by Ministers, party leaders, or leadership contestants and harmonizes rules applicable to contest expenses of nomination contestants and leadership contestants. The purpose here is to provide transparency of election related financing for voters.

Two resolutions were passed at the 2019 National Convention: **Resolution 2019.01 Canada to Honour its Commitment to the United Nations' Convention on the Rights of the Child**, and **Resolution 2019.02 Canadian Support for the United Nations' Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons**. The action plan for resolution 2019.01 which is under the Christian Family Life committee asks us to write to the Prime Minister and the Minister of Justice urging for legal protection of children before birth. It asks us to participate in the Day of Prayer for the Legal Protection of Unborn Children on January 22. This should be in our calendar to inform our membership. The action plan for resolution 2019.02 suggests holding a speaker presentation on the necessity of banning nuclear weapons, provide a list of websites and printed material to

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inform, and, of course, to write letters. As these falls under the Legislation committee, I will look into some of the available resources.

Resolutions form the policy of who and what the League is as an organization. They are also how we can act in matters of social justice which is the third of the League's Core Values. The first step is to find a topic for which you have a passion. A resolution can be directed within the League or outside the League if the purpose is to influence others to take action, to petition or express concern as in the two resolutions above. The purposes of a resolution addressed to the League are to propose a plan, establish policy, recommend action or censure. I propose a resolution addressed to the League to make every effort to end the use of single use plastics and Styrofoam at our activities, perhaps even in our parishes. I thought a way to proceed with this might be to contact the Resolutions chairpersons in the diocese and work together to keep the effort of presenting a resolution moving forward.

CHAS Report

November 2019

The 16th Annual CHAS Convention in Prince Albert Oct 24-25 theme was "Mission is Possible".

We enjoyed the optional tour of Mont St. Joseph Home – an updated 120 bed senior care facility built in 1997 replacing an older one.

Dr. Shane Sinclair, an associate professor and spiritual care practitioner from Calgary was keynote speaker. His research paper on sympathy, empathy and compassion was awarded "Paper of the Year" by Palliative Medicine, the world's premier care journal.

Compassion means "to suffer with" – an intentional response to know a person, discern their needs and meet their needs with action. A helpful suggestion that brought satisfaction was where a client at intake fills a questionnaire as to what they desire. A positive relationship with the suffering patient sharing space with a virtuous caregiver brings compassion.

Compassion comes from inside of you with love. Sit instead of stand. Be intuitive with more than presence by being open with a curious attitude putting oneself in shoes of other so as to understand where they are at. Do the extra little bit above and beyond necessity.

"Suffering and love are two normal parts of transformation" – Richard Rohr. We learn from our life experience of suffering as well as how it is modelled by someone. In relational factors we need to be careful of perceived judgements and stay objective with active listening.

The impact of systemic and time challenge can cause compassion fatigue and burnout of caregivers. Self-compassion can be problematic as it takes two for a relationship. Do unto others for happiness. Evidence shows that people are happier to give than to receive. If you want to be happy, practise compassion. If you want others to be happy, receive compassion.

Dr. Debra Parker-Oliver, a nationally known researcher on Hospice Caregiving and Professor at University of Missouri, topic was "Caregiving: A Journey to Redefine Hope Through Mission". Despite her professional credentials she found herself ill-prepared to face her husband's illness and death. About their journey they produced 28 YouTube videos to teach about death, to lose its fear and to live. It affects the whole family. In hospice care they learned to ask and receive social support and pain management. Noting there was no mention of God, prayer or any spirituality, we were surprised with the reply to such a question "Did not want to offend anyone if they had a different belief"!

Mission is Possible – The journey of Grace-filled Compassion

Daniel Lussier, ICD.D

Daniel Lussier is CEO of the Catholic Health Corporation of Manitoba (CHCM), which was created by the Grey Nuns in 2000. It sponsors 15 health and human service agencies which provide compassionate care and support to Manitobans.

More than ten years ago it launched the Compassion Project which leads people on a journey toward a deeper sense of purpose. They provide programs to health care providers which enhance person-to – person practices and encourage spiritual and communal well-being. The research shows that providing these programs, results in healthier and happier caregivers and the organizations flourish.

He listed 3 pillars to a journey toward our deeper sense of purpose: 1. Awareness 2. Education and Formation 3. Sustainability. CHCM did not reinvent the wheel. Instead, they went to the world to see what research was done already and they built on that. They offer a variety of programs to help health care providers cope better.

All the programs are 6-8 weeks, many have been used for 10 years already, and have had 3500 people participate. Participants are studied before and after. Results are impressive. Some he mentioned:

- 1. Contemplative approach The ability to be more compassionate went up.
- 2. Mindfulness Significant improvement
- 3. Study on Perceived Stress stress at 8 weeks, 3 and 8 months, all significantly down from before the program
- 4. Study on Well-being self kindness goes up and stays there
- 5. Fears of Compassion Study for others, from others, for self, all go down

6. Spiritual Well-Being scale – overall, meaning/peace and faith all better after the program. He concluded by having all of us close our eyes while he led us through a 5 minute meditation routine of deep breathing. By being mindful, we slowly relaxed and cleared our heads. It was a mini exercise to show us what the Catholic Health Corporation is doing for caregivers in Manitoba.

Leah Perrault – Director of Mission at St. Paul's Hospital in Saskatoon.

Leah's talk focused on Mission in the Middle of the Mess. She gave personal examples in her life when disappointments and tragedy happened. At those times she learned we need to rely on something bigger than ourselves to help us rise to compassion and grace. She was grateful that in her brokenness she had people who reached out to her and expressed love and concern. It was an indication that we have a God who enters deeply into our grief.

Mission is organizational spirituality. Support people who need help. Mobilize others to help. Make connections. Love the people who are impacted. We choose how to react to negative happenings.

Leah explained her Five Mission Practices of Rising Compassion: 1. Competence 2. Connecting 3. Commitment 4. Construction 5. Creativity
